

"BEFORE ITS TIME!" says Bob Hohman, 1956 Tarentum High graduate, of the imposing building known as Grandview—once home to Tarentum High School. "It was and still is, a remarkable and inspiring building."

History tells us that the location for the new school was selected specifically for it's commanding view of Tarentum. It was Joseph K. Fulton, Sr. who gave it the name of Grandview. But it was the famous architect, Press C. Dowler who designed the remarkable building with its majestic bell tower, impressive clock, gargoyles and magnificent stairway.

And if the site of the school was chosen for its view of Tarentum, once the structure was built, it was Grandview itself that became a sight to behold. After the Tarentum bridge was built in the 1950s, Grandview became the very symbol of the community for the thousands catching sight of it as they crossed the span toward Tarentum.

Grandview first opened in 1915 as a grade school. It became Tarentum High School in 1928 when First Ward School could no longer accommodate the growing high school student population.

Tarentum High School graduates have many happy memories of their time at the Grandview site. There were the Redcats' athletic achievements like winning the 1940 WPIAL Football Championship and the 1968 Basketball Championship. There were many academic and artistic accomplishments as well as clubs, traditions and of course fun.

In 1968 Tarentum School District merged with Har-Brack to become Highlands School District. The last Tarentum High School graduation ceremony took place on June 5, 1968. Following the merger, Grandview underwent extensive renovations and is today once again, an elementary school.

# TARENTUM HIGH SCHOOL—GONE BUT NOT FORGOTTEN

"Everyone knew everyone no matter if you were in 7th grade or 12th grade," says Jean Pavlik of Tarentum's class of 1953. "We were all friends and remained friends. "Dances, football games and all of the extra-curricular activities were the greatest."

Bob Hohman's fondest memories were the Basketball games in the gym, especially when going to the play offs. "Crowds were so large; it was standing room only. The whole community came out to support them. It was a very special time."

"I enjoyed being a majorette for 4 years. I loved it!" says Jane McClelland, a 1964 graduate who reminisced about all the fun, like Henry's and the Sadie Hawkins dance.

To this day, many Tarentum High School groups meet monthly for a classmates' luncheon. A group from the class of 1956 has been doing this for years. "Meeting with high school friends brings back all the memories, reminiscing about fun times that kids don't experience today," says Barb Magnetta of the class of 1956.

Rose Mary "Babe" Mazza, class of 1949, loved that her class was called "The forty-niners." She remembers walking to school, making four trips a day from West Tarentum to the high school, home for lunch, back to school, then home again. "We were all one big community."

Tarentum High School memories last a lifetime and we know there are many more out there. We invite all Tarentum High alums to send in their favorite memories of being a Redcat and we'll publish them in this magazine for others to enjoy.

# BLACKBURN'S Physicians Pharmacy, Inc.

# THE EARLY YEARS!

### BY CHARLES R. BLACKBURN, RP

grew up in my father's business, founded in 1936—85 years ago.

Born 1909 in Trafford PA, Charles E. Blackburn was the youngest of nine children. His family relocated to Florida when he was in high school because my grandfather had developed pulmonary disease as a coal miner and couldn't endure the pollution and harsh Pennsylvania winters. Father was allowed to live with his best friend, Wyant Dettis, whose father owned Wyant's Drug Company in Trafford. He worked in the drug store which had a full fledge soda fountain and booming

lunch counter. Food was prepared by Mrs. Dettis and her sister in the two floors above where they all lived. The memory of food odors, especially of





fish on Fridays permeated the building and would remain with my father for life.

Father graduated from Pitt Pharmacy School in 1931 and passed the state board in 1932. His independence showed when he and five friends decided to see the USA in an open touring car, working their way to California. By 1934, he was back in Trafford and ready to work, taking a job for Central Drug Store of Pittsburgh, which sent him to Tarentum.

Tarentum was a busy town and Central Drug had two stores on Corbet Street, one beside Greeks Confectionary and

the other beside Fishkin's Ladies Apparel Store. He found a room in Mrs. Stevenson's Tea Room that first night and wrote my future mother, Jane: "This is a hellava town and I think less of the job."

Two years later, on March 15, 1936, the devastating St. Patrick's Day Flood struck the Allegheny Valley towns. Father managed one Central Drug and Elder Stein managed the other. When the water receded, their district manager instructed them to salvage and clean what had been under water and place the items for resale. Disgusted at the thought of doing such a thing to their customers, Stein and my Father decided to resign their positions and start their own business as partners.

They borrowed \$250 from Dr. Orris, MD and opened BLACKBURN-STEIN DRUG STORE at 408 E. Sixth Avenue, chosen for its location above the flood plain. Years later, Mr. Stein relocated to Squirrel Hill. Father needing a larger store, closer to the bus routes and physicians' offices, moved into the Mauro Building on the southeast corner of Third Avenue and Corbet streets, hiring William Ross, RP.

I was just a kid in the 1940's but I have vivid memories of my very first job, delivering Smallpox vaccine to Dr. Leydic's office. I was only four or five, but I recall running up the steps, the receptionist announcing that the vaccine had arrived and Dr. Leydic shouting, "Send Chuckie in." He would weigh me and check my height on his large scale each time I made a delivery. Today, I have that same scale in my office.

In 1952, the 301 Corbet Street lot where Black-burn's Pharmacy is located today, became available when the Borough decided to move the WWII Honor Roll to Tarentum Park. My father decided to buy the lot and build his own pharmacy there. His offer of \$1,000 was accepted, but when he went to the attorney's office to complete the deal, he learned the price had changed to \$10,000. The attorney told him that he had bought the lot saying, "You are now buying it from me. That is how business is done. Get used to it!" Father paid the price but never forgot the importance of ethics.

The steel strike prevented construction of the building as planned. Two years later, in 1954, Bill Larkin, VND photographer, photographed my father in the new pharmacy. His logo was

# "THE VALLEY'S FIRST TRULY PROFESSIONAL PHARMACY"

-no soda fountain, no lunch counter, no food odors!

By the time I was in 8<sup>th</sup> or 9<sup>th</sup> grade, I was filling prescriptions and being educated by my father's employee, Will Lloyd, RP, about the importance of knowing the side effects of drugs. These were valuable lessons, underscored by todays' laws where pharmacists counsel patients.

Before I knew it, it was 1956, and I was graduating from Tarentum High. My parents wanted me to become a doctor. My father was a pharmacist and I did not know what I wanted to do. A serendipitous meeting with David Dodds, assistant principal, suggested something else might interest me and off I went to study Biology.

Simultaneously, the Heights Plaza opened, the Tarentum business district was collapsing. Physicians were relocating to the Heights Plaza Medical Center. When I returned from college in 1960, our business was near bankruptcy, and father was working 13-hour days, seven days a week. Med School was out of the question.

My greatest fear was father's arduous work would end with him selling the business.



The Pittsburgh Brewing Company is the talk of the region these days. And Tarentum has big role in all of this—IT'S OUR WATER.



n army of welders, electricians, carpenters, and other specialists has transformed the former Pittsburgh Plate Glassworks (PPG) in Creighton into what brewery owner, Cliff Forrest says will be one of the top breweries on the east coast. PBC President Todd Zwicker confirmed this state-of-the-art brewery will become a destination that will boast a brewery store, museum, marina, and who knows what else.



But even before any of those ideas become reality, it is the brewery itself that will be the destination. Once the enormous tanks are polished, visitors will be able to stand on the mezzanine-high above the floor and view the whole operation and it will be quite a spectacle. First, there's the sheer size of the place—so big you can hardly see from one end to the other. Then there are the miles of stainless-steel pipes, tubes, and processing lines that took a team of welders more than 10,000 welds to complete. Through this system, will flow thousands of gallons of beer in various stages of the brewing process. The finished brew is then stored in enormous tanks-15 of them containing 500 gallons each of fermentation vessels and 10 more tanks containing 250 gallons each. For tourists on the mezzanine, it will be an awesome sight.

And what of the beer? It was President Zwicker who was determined to have a great team. Among them is Director of Brewing and Quality Assurance, Brandon Mayes, who was making a name for himself at a brewery in Vermont.

Although Mayes loved Vermont, with its mountains and year-round outdoor activities, he happily confides, "They didn't have to do any arm twisting to get me to Pittsburgh Brewery," Mayes originally hails from York, Pennsylvania and proudly identifies as a diehard Steeler, Penguin, and Pirate fan. And he's excited to explore all of our region's near-by hiking trails, bike paths and other natural wonders.

Mayes, a youngish man, earned his undergraduate degree in biology at Dartmouth specializing in aquatic ecology, studying plankton. Brandon had long been an avid home brewer. "I know a lot about water and water chemistry and wanted to get into brewing, which he did at Long Trail and Otter Creek. I just basically love beer!

When Carrie Fox, Tarentum Council at Large and Tarentum Magazine Publisher Tom Costello recently toured the new Pittsburgh Brewery in Creighton they learned that brewery owner Cliff Forrest chose to purchase the former PPG building for conversion into a brewery because the company's former brewery site in Lawrenceville would have been too costly to convert to up-to-date brewing standards. Since the Lawrenceville site was closed, Iron City Beer, I.C. Light, I.C. Light Mango, Old German and Block House beer have been brewed at the old Rolling Rock facility in Latrobe.

Once the Creighton site is fully operational, all Pittsburgh Brewery products will be brewed at the new Creighton facility.

And this is where
Tarentum and its water flow into the story. According to Mayes, the quality of the water is the most important ingredient in any beer. Tarentum water is a good fit because it is low in salt and calcium. It's what the experts call, a neutral water and the only thing that must be removed is the residual chlorine.

Mayes says, "What I do is recipe development and design...breaking beer down into biochemical components, looking specifically at the water profile you're going to brew with, the fermentation profile. The quality aspect of my job is making sure we have the equipment and procedures in place that will get us the specifications that we want. For example there is a very small window


for bitterness, a very small window for color, for carbonation and for alcohol content."

"I'm fortunate in that I can start the brewing process with the right water. Tarentum water allows us to maintain a consistent water profile, which is essential to achieving the exact same taste in every batch. Beer lovers expect this."

Pittsburgh Brewery is expected to open for business this summer.







I was born, raised and lived in West Tarentum all my life and I can tell you, I had the most awesome childhood anyone could experience!

Most people would never imagine the great variety of businesses that were located along and around West Seventh Avenue. You could say that we had almost every type of store or professional service anyone would need. Our house was right there on West Eighth Avenue, so I got to grow up with my Saint Clement Church & School on West Ninth Avenue plus all the candy and ice cream stores that I could walk or run to—which I frequented quite often. It doesn't get any better than that for a kid!

We had grocery stores like Prackos Groceries, which was my most favorite. I would run down there through the lot beside the Allegheny Valley General Hospital on West Seventh Avenue at lunch time to get freshly cut lunch meat. Other food stores included Sam's Fruit Market, Gaydos and Davidek's Butcher Shops, and Da-

videk's Restaurant, Thorofare, Sparkle Markets, and Painter's Variety Store.

Never short on wonderful bakers and sweet treats, West Tarentum had the Dennis Bakery, Reitler Bakery, Culligan's Penny-Candy Store and Altany's Confectionary Store. Then there were the soda fountains at Murtland's and Meinz Drug Stores and Bard's, which served delicious ice cream specialties.

West Seventh Avenue was booming and bustling every day and we even had a trolley for a time. So says Joseph Bodnar, a longtime resident, and military veteran, who is up on his Tarentum history. He so graciously shared his memories and knowledge with me in the writing of this article. As Joseph explained, "The trolley would take you anywhere for

15 cents. You boarded on Ross Street and were able to go as far as the Natrona Heights honor roll." Joseph says the trolley cars were in existence from 1936 through 1945.

On the corner of the newly built Tarentum Bridge and West Seventh Avenue was Henry's, a popular snack shop with its lunch counter, juke-box and pinball machines. Teenagers from all over crowded the dance floor on Friday nights. Across the street from Henry's was Greenwald Ford. Farther down West Seventh Avenue were the Allegheny and Torrence Gasoline Stations,

Henry's Ice Cream Bar

Motosicke Jeweler, Yannuzzi Shoe Repair, Freidman's Furniture Store, the Jednota Slovak Club, and a State Liquor Store.

West Tarentum even had its own theatre, the Penn, located on the two-hundred block of West Seventh Avenue. We also had professional services like Carlaccini Dental, Frank's Flower Shop, Doctor McQuade's office, Sacco and Lovasik Insurance, Posney Electric and two funer-

al homes, Dusters and Schottenheimers.

If a child was given a couple of pennies, a nickel or dime they could run to any of the "Mom and Pop Stores" that were on most corners. Vrsankys, Red Browns, Majewskis, Michaleks, Drobkas, Durkacs, Lettrichs and Sagaths, to name a few.



To burn off the calories and have some fun, we could go down to West End Field where the Tarentum baseball team played. In addition to the ball field, there were swings, and a huge sand box. West End Field was located below West Sixth Avenue, beyond the railroad tracks. It was large enough to have several events going on simultaneously.

All in all, you could say we had the best of all worlds, growing up in West Tarentum.

I guess that is why I am still living here.




